Historic Walking Tours on Main are open to the public & completely free of charge.





News of Oxford- 1870s

Selma Dollar Time, 21 March 1870 (Selma, AL)

Dr. S. C. Williams, S. C. Kelly, E. G. Robertson, John Yoe, W. J. Borden, Chas. Martin, and D. D. Draper were elected Councilmen of the town of oxford on the 7th inst.

The Times-Argus, 13 October 1871 (Selma, AL) A new Methodist church is being built at Oxford.

The Montgomery Advertiser, 18 January 1872 (Montgomery, AL)

By same, to prohibit liquor sales in the town of Oxford and within five miles thereof. Read three times under a suspension of the rules and passed.

The Montgomery Advertiser, 17 February 1874 (Montgomery, AL)
Messrs. Dodson and Goodhue are meeting with great success in their school at the beautiful town of Oxford in Calhoun county. They have pupils from Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina, Arkansas and Texas


The Montgomery Advertiser, 29 January 1876 (Montgomery, AL)

Also, reviving certain acts therein named, so far as the town of Oxford is concerned, and placing restrictions upon the sale of liquors in said town all of which were ordered to a second reading tomorrow.

The Shelby Sentinel, 20 November 1879 (Columbiana, AL)

Messrs. Draper, Son & Co., merchants and bankers, of Oxford, Ala., have purchased four lots in our town and will commence building with the view of having their store ready for occupancy by

January 1st, when they will open with a twenty five thousand dollar stock.
