2024 YEAR-END REPORT

Historic Main Street Oxford (HMSO) is an economic and community development organization that focuses on the Four Point Approach strategy of Organization, Promotion, Design, and Economic Vitality as outlined by Main Street America. The Four Point Approach makes Main Street and effective tool for a community-based, volunteer-driven, grassroots revitalization effort. HMSO was created in 2014 when Oxford became a Designated Main Street Community by Main Street Alabama.

Public investment is the documented work or improvements done by the City of Oxford. (new garbage receptacles, benches, landscaping, etc.).

<u>FAÇADE IMPROVEMENT GRANT PROGRAM</u>

PRIVATE- \$2,336,502 **PUBLIC-** \$35,257

In 2019, the Oxford City Council created the façade improvement grant program to assist property and business owners with an incentive to improve their respective properties. Since creation of the program, the private investment has greatly exceeded the public investment. As of January 2025, the total of private dollars expended has been \$2,471,763, and the total of public dollars expended has been \$66,898.

In March 2024, Main Street Alabama staff and local program directors gathered in Montgomery for Main Street Alabama's Day on the Hill. Hunter Gentry, Director of Historic Main Street Oxford, met with Senator Keith Kelley to discuss the critical importance of revitalizing downtown Oxford and supporting small businesses.

Throughout 2024, Historic Main Street Oxford spearheaded several impactful initiatives. The program organized three downtown litter cleanup days in March, June, and September, fostering community pride and beautification. Additionally, in partnership with Oxford Lumber and GoSocial Marketing, a quarterly Window & Storefront Contest highlighted local businesses. The 2024 winners included TEAM Rehabilitation in the spring, The Vine Chiropractic in the summer, and English Cottage Florist & Gift, which secured both the fall and winter awards.

In early May, Main Street Alabama hosted the prestigious Main Street America 2024 Now Conference, welcoming directors, board members, downtown development professionals, and community leaders from across the United States and Japan. Delegates from states including Alabama, Georgia, Indiana, Iowa, Massachusetts, Michigan, Texas, and Washington enjoyed an engaging itinerary across East Alabama. Highlights included tours of Heflin's Carillon Oaks, Pinhoti Trailhead, and Cahulga Creek Park. In Oxford, participants dined at Hubbard's Off Main and toured the Oxford Performing Arts Center, Southern Girl Coffee Roasting Co., and the anticipated Spring Street Station at the historic Oxford Railway Depot. The conference concluded with visits to Anniston landmarks such as the Freedom Riders National Monument, Noble Street Park, and the Sinclair Social.

In July 2024, Historic Main Street Oxford collaborated with the Oxford Maintenance Department to restore historic concrete street markers installed in the 1950s. Painted white with black lettering, these markers can be found at key downtown intersections, including Dodson and Monger Streets, East Choccolocco and Hale Streets, and others.

August brought special recognition for Historic Main Street Oxford's 10th anniversary. The Director of Community Relations for Representative Mike Rogers presented a framed copy of the Congressional Record in honor of the milestone. The organization also presented two Awards of Excellence: the Commercial Award to Tammie Shaddix State Farm Agency for their commitment to maintaining and enhancing the charm of their property and the Residential Award to the Boullemet Family for their similar contributions to downtown character.

In November 2024, Main Street Alabama launched the Sweet Hometown Tours: Alabama's Main Street Trail. This statewide trail system showcases the unique experiences of the 33



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designated Main Street communities, acting as a guide for residents and visitors to explore Alabama's vibrant downtown districts.

Historic Main Street Oxford further celebrated the city's heritage by sponsoring 10 bronze plaques for historic buildings that exemplify Oxford's history through their character, preservation, and style. Notable plaques include the following:
